







The Network for Public Health Law U.S. COVID Cases - Select Localities

Orleans Parish Skyrocketing COVID-19 Rate

While other places have had more total known cases, Orleans Parish -- home to New Orleans -appears to be outpacing other hotspots in known COVID-19 cases per capita. This analysis looked at the counties hit hardest by coronavirus but is not an exhaustive survey. And increased testing nationwide will likely lead to a surge of new cases across the board.

Presidential Powers and Response to COVID-19

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) modeling suggests that, without mitigation, severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), the virus that causes novel coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), could infect more than 60% of the US population. President Trump has declared a national emergency along with 50 governors declaring state emergencies (Figure), which are unprecedented actions. Social distancing aims to flatten the epidemic curve to moderate demand on the health system. Consequently, whether through voluntary actions or state mandates, individuals are increasingly sheltering at home, schools and universities are closing, businesses are altering operations, and mass gatherings are being canceled. On March 16, the health officers of 6 local governments in the San Francisco Bay Area issued mandatory orders to shelter in place, making it a misdemeanor offense to leave home for any nonessential purpose.


Travel Restrictions

Recently, the president banned most non-US citizens from entry into the United States traveling from the Schengen area (an area comprising 26 European states that have officially abolished all passport and other types of border control), the United Kingdom, and Ireland, on top of existing bans from China and Iran. The CDC rarely issues advisories against travel to particular locations within the US and has not done so to date for COVID-19. The CDC last advised against domestic travel during the 2017 Zika outbreak, recommending pregnant women avoid travel to southern Florida. While the White House has policies for military and government personnel traveling to places experiencing high levels of COVID-19 cases, it has not, as of yet, restricted do-




Multi-level Emergencies






Mar. 20: Phoenix City Council met to debate Mayor Kate Gallego's emergency declaration on 3/17 closing bars and dine-in restaurants

- Multiple council members voiced concerns over "a great emergency" authorizing the Mayor to make key decisions without public input
- Council ultimately ratifies declaration after 3 hour debate




Dear Speaker Pelosi, Leader McConnell, Leader McCarthy, and Leader Schumer:

Harris County Public Guidance - March 12, 2020

These steps are recommended until March 31, 2020 or until otherwise noted.

Guidance for People at Higher Risk for Severe COVID-19 Illness

People at higher risk of severe illness should stay home and away from large groups of people as much as possible, including public places with lots of people and large gatherings where there will be close contact with others. Gatherings of seniors or other people at higher risk of severe illness should be canceled or postponed. Those at higher risk include:

- People 60 and older.
- People with underlying health conditions (e.g. heart disease, lung disease, diabetes)
- People who have weakened immune systems.
- Pregnant women.

Caregivers of children with underlying health conditions should consult with healthcare providers about whether their children should stay home. Anyone who has questions about whether their condition puts them at increased risk for severe COVID-19 illness should consult with their healthcare provider. Screening & Testing

March 3: Vice President Pence announces massive expansion of who is eligible for COVID testing: "Any American can be tested . . . subject to doctor's orders."

March 21: "Health officials in [NY, CA] and other hard-hit parts of the country are restricting coronavirus testing to health care workers and people who are hospitalized, saying the battle to contain the virus is lost and we are moving into a new phase of the pandemic response.







Large events and mass gatherings can contribute to the spread of COVID-19 in the United States via travelers who attend these events and introduce the virus to new communities. Examples of large events and mass gatherings include conferences, festivals, parades, concerts, sporting events, weddings, and other types of

White House and CDC recommend no inperson events consisting of 10 or more people throughout the United States.

Constitutional Challenges






Mar. 17: Multiple persons sued to constitutionally challenge New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu's order prohibiting statewide gatherings of 50 or more people:

- "We can choose to assemble if that is our desire. What cannot occur is one man in a position of power deciding to strip us of our rights in the name of safety and without due process."
- Merrimack County Superior Court denied the request for a hearing

COVID-19 Patient Refuses Isolation





Mar. 17: 53-year-old COVID-19 patient in Nelson County hospital refuses isolation & checks out

- Nelson County Judge Executive Dean Watts declared a state of emergency to "force a selfisolation or quarantine."
- Law enforcement is stationed outside the individual's residence 24/7 for 2 weeks to enforce home isolation


Feb. 28: After obtaining temporary restraining order to block the transfer of individuals exposed to or infected with COVID-19 to Costa Mesa, CA, feds drop their plans and case is dismissed.



March 2: City of San
Antonio sues in federal
district court to attempt to

120+ COVID evacuees from
quarantine at Joint Base
San Antonio-Lackland. The
motion was denied.



"Shelter in Place" Orders





Shelterless Population Litigation

Mar. 21: PA Governor Tom Wolfe rescinded part of his order for all "non-life-sustaining" businesses to close given:

- Disdain re: economic impacts
- Legal challenges led by a law firm & gun store
- New guidance excepting timber industry, coal mining, hotels, accountants, laundromats & some law firms
- Allows "robust waiver process" for businesses seeking exemption
- Will localities enforce?









Shelterless Population Litigation





Mar. 19: Emergency hearing called by U.S. District Judge David O. Carter to address claims by the L.A. Alliance for Human Rights, Skid-Row business owners, and former shelterless individuals:

- Allegations that local officials were negligent in failing to act to protect the shelterless population from COVID-19
- Seeks training, healthcare & sheltering for homeless persons


