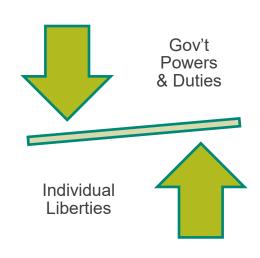

What is Public Health Law?

The study of the legal powers and duties of the state to assure the conditions for people to be healthy (to identify, prevent, and ameliorate risks to health in the population) and the limitations on the power of the state to constrain the autonomy, privacy, liberty, proprietary or other legally protected interests of individuals for the common good.

Types of Legislation We Reviewed

Shift of General or Emergency Public Health Authority

- Local Public Health Agency to Another Local Entity
- Local Public Health Agency to State Public Health Agency or State Legislature
- State Public Health Agency to Governor or State Legislature
- State Executive to State Legislature
- Prohibition of Certain Types of State or Local Public Health Orders





LHD to other Local Entity

Florida, Indiana, Kansas, Montana, Utah, West Virginia, Maryland, Missouri

Prohibit Certain State/Local PH Orders

Kansas, Montana, North Dakota, Ohio, Arizona, Tennessee, Texas

Montana House Bills 121 and 257: LHD to Other Local Entity

» Bill Purpose/ Effect

*Local governing body may rescind local BOH emergency orders;

*Prohibits quarantine of individuals who are not yet ill, but reasonably believed to be infected or exposed.

*Bars local ordinances from business closures except in limited circumstances

» Current Status

Enacted.

» Implications

Increases risk, creates confusion, scope includes environmental health and sanitation





Indiana Senate Bill 5: <u>LHD to SHD or State</u> <u>Legislature</u>

» Bill Purpose/ Effect

Prevents local health officers from imposing emergency disease prevention measures on individuals and businesses that are more stringent than those issued by the governor.

Requires that the local governing body approve any health order with provisions that go beyond state requirements during an emergency.

» Current Status

Enacted over governor's veto

» Implications

Delays action; limits flexibility and nimbleness; reduces ability to tailor orders to local needs and data;





North Dakota House Bill 1323: <u>Prohibition on</u> Certain State or Local Public Health Orders

» Bill Purpose/ Effect

Prohibits a statewide elected official or state health officer from requiring any individual in the state to wear a face mask, shield, or other type of face covering.

» Current Status

Enacted over governor's veto

» Implications

Impedes a coordinated response to pandemics and other airborne threats that require face coverings as a mitigation measure. This law severely undercuts statewide efforts to respond to pandemics or disasters by creating a piecemeal and uncoordinated system.





Kansas House Bill 2016: SHD to Governor or State Legislature

» Bill Purpose/ Effect

Removes the Governor's ability to close businesses during a public health emergency,

Requires legislative approval to extend a Governor's emergency order

» Current Status

Enacted

» Implications

Shifting responsibility from state and local health departments to elected officials marginalizes public health experience; limits preparedness and ability to effectively mitigate infectious disease outbreaks; and may adversely affect routine public health activities





Florida Senate Bill 2006: <u>State Executive to State Legislature</u>

» Bill Purpose/ Effect

*Authorizes the Legislature to terminate orders or directives issued by the Governor under a state of emergency.

*Prevents a business or government entity or educational institution from requiring proof of COVID-19 vaccination to access services.

» Status

Enacted

» Implications

Allows the Legislature to "veto" orders issued under a declared emergency. Additional provisions limit, delay, and impair ability of local governments to respond to public health emergencies.





Report Conclusions

- » Legislation to block reasonable public health measures poses an immediate threat to life and health.
- » Legislation to stop expert public health agencies from leading the response to health emergencies creates unforeseen, serious risks to life and health.
- » Legislation that strips authority from public health agencies and the executive branch and transfers it to the Legislature violates the constitutional separation of powers and undermines effective government response.
- » If adopted, these bills would make it harder to advance health equity during a pandemic that has disproportionately sickened and killed Black, Hispanic and Latino, and Indigenous Americans.




